

Background

Periodic Reporting is one of the core monitoring mechanisms of the World Heritage Convention. Every six to eight years or so, the States Parties are invited to submit to the World Heritage Committee a Periodic Report on the application of the World Heritage Convention in their territory. The 3rd cycle of Periodic Reporting was completed in 2021, involving all National Focal Points, site managers and Category 2 Centres from the 44 States Parties from the region at the time. The periodic report for Asia and the Pacific with the associated **Regional Framework Action Plan** (2023-2030) was presented at the extended 45th session of the World Heritage Committee where it was **endorsed**.

The 5th HeritAP Chat¹ will be dedicated to **review** the exercise, outcome and action plan of the 3rd Cycle of Periodic Reporting in Asia and the Pacific region. Like in the previous cycle, we will discuss the implementation of various components of the Action Plan (2023-2030) with a view to identify potential partners. Its main focus will be the role of the WHITRAP and the other agencies namely WHC, Advisory Bodies (ICCROM, ICOMOS and IUCN) and C2Cs in APA and enhancing the networking to implement the Regional Framework Action Plan (2023-2030).

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¹ The World Heritage Institute of Training and Research for the Asia and the Pacific Region under the auspices of UNESCO (WHITRAP) is a UNESCO category 2 centre. Its mission is to strengthen the implementation of the World Heritage Convention in Asia and the Pacific region through training, research, dissemination information and network building. In order to enhance the role of networking. Himalchuli GURUNG

Short Resume:

Himalchuli Gurung graduated in Architecture and Building Technology from the University of the Philippines in 1994 and practiced her profession as an architect in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia from 1994 to 1998.

She joined UNESCO in 1998 as a United Nations Volunteer for the International Safeguarding Campaign for the Kathmandu Valley World Heritage Site in Nepal and as National Programme Officer for Education and Culture with UNESCO Kathmandu Office in Nepal from 2000 to 2004. During this period, she was involved in the establishment of Community Learning Centres (CLCs) integrating culture and education programme activities in formal and non-formal education in Nepal. She was part of the Reactive Monitoring Mission to *Lumbini, the Birthplace of the Lord Buddha* World Heritage site in Nepal in 2000.

From 2004 to 2008 she was appointed as the Culture Programme Specialist in the UNESCO Jakarta Office in Indonesia, responsible for UNESCO's Culture programme activities in Brunei Darussalam, Indonesia, Malaysia, the Philippines and Timore Leste. During this period, she was responsible for the implementation of culture projects in Ache and Nias provinces in Indonesia in the aftermath of the 2004 Indian Ocean Tsunami. She was part of the Rapid Assessment Mission to *Prambanan World Heritage site* in Indonesia in June 2006 in the aftermath of the 2006 Java earthquake, and the WHC-ICOMOS Reactive Monitoring mission to *Borobudur Temple Compounds* World Heritage site in 2006.

From 2008 to 2015 she was the Culture Programme Specialist with the UNESCO Kingston Office in Jamaica, responsible for UNESCO's Culture programme activities in 18 Caribbean Countries/Territories. She implemented several capacity-building projects in the field of World Heritage, Living Heritage, Diversity of

Cultural Expressions and Underwater Cultural Heritage in the Caribbean which led to the ratification of key culture conventions by many Caribbean countries. She contributed towards the nomination of *Blue and John Crow Mountains* World Heritage site in Jamaica which was inscribed in 2015.

Her last field posting was with UNESCO Beijing Office in China from 2015-2022, where she was responsible for the implementation of UNESCO's Culture Programme activities in Democratic People's Republic of Korea, Japan, Mongolia, the People's Republic of China and the Republic of Korea. She worked in the promotion of culture for sustainable development and the protection of cultural diversity through the implementation of integrated operational projects aimed at the preservation of tangible and intangible heritage, the promotion of diversity, cultural expressions and intercultural dialogue. At the request of the World Heritage Centre, she headed the WHC/ICOMOS/ICCROM Reactive Monitoring mission to the World Heritage property of the *Historic Ensemble of the Potala Palace*, Lhasa, China in 2019.

She also served as the UNESCO Director-General's representative on the Governing Boards of the UNESCO Category II Centres in the field of intangible cultural heritage, namely: the International Training Centre for Intangible Cultural Heritage in the Asia-Pacific Region in China; the International Information and Networking Centre for Intangible Cultural Heritage in the Asia-Pacific Region in Republic of Korea; and the International Research Centre for Intangible Cultural Heritage in the Asia-Pacific Region in Japan from 2016 to 2022.

Since August 2022, she is the Chief of Asia and the Pacific Unit of the World Heritage, Culture Sector at UNESCO Headquarters in Paris.



Joseph KING

Joseph King provides support for the Director General of ICCROM in the implementation of the mandates of the organization, with a particular focus on governance issues. Previously at ICCROM, he has been Director of Partnership and Communication, Director of the Sites Unit, and a Senior Project Manager working on the AFRICA 2009 programme, a long-term regional programme for the conservation of immovable cultural heritage in Sub-Saharan Africa. He was also involved in the development of the first Integrated Territorial and Urban Conservation course and the development and implementation of courses related to the conservation of stone, wood, and modern architecture. Before joining ICCROM, he worked as a consultant to UNESCO on a project to write a conservation plan for the Old Town of Mombasa in Kenya.




Gamini WIJESURIYA

And also digital archiving of photographs and records related to past research on Okinoshima ritual sites. Based on the analysis of the data, she has been conducting research to reconstruct the ancient rituals that took place on the Island.

Marie-Noël TOURNOUX joined WHITRAP Shanghai in April 2018, as Project Director. She studied Art history and English Literature at the Sorbonne University, Paris, France. She was a researcher for the French Ministry of Culture's Cultural Inventory Service. Her research area was 19th and 20th century architecture and urban heritage, religious architecture and resort towns. From 2002 to 2017 she worked at the World Heritage Centre, UNESCO, in several Regional and Thematic Units. She was involved in many technical assistance and policy guidance projects for national and local governments as well as training and state of conservation monitoring activities, in Europe, Africa and Asia, focusing mainly on urban heritage and cultural landscapes. She has extensive experience in World Heritage management strategic planning as well as urban and heritage development capacity building. She assisted in the development UNESCO's "Recommendation on the Historic Urban Landscape" (HUL) adopted in 2011. She implemented HUL related projects and studies in her time at UNESCO. In 2015 to 2016 she assisted in UNESCO's Global Report for sustainable development "Culture: Urban Future".

At WHITRAP she focuses on the implementation of HUL, the World Heritage Periodic Reporting Exercise and methodological exchanges on heritage documentation and conservation with the University of Xiamen, School of Architecture and Civil Engineering and the Italian Council for National Research. She is a member of ICOMOS and ICOMOS ISCCL and CIVVIH. She is very interested in the evolution of the role and function of heritage and its acknowledgement as a solution for resilient territorial development.

He is also serving as Deputy Director of International Centre on Space Technologies for Natural and Cultural Heritage (HIST) under the Auspices of UNESCO, Chair of Digital Heritage Specialized Committee of China National Committee, International Society for Digital Earth (ISDE), Co-Chair of the Heritage Working Group of the Digital Belt and Road Programme (DBAR), Member of International Council on Monuments and Sites (ICOMOS), Executive Member of ICOMOS-China, Member of the world heritage Expert Committee of the State Forestry and Grass Administration of China.

Prof. Wang is engaged in the research of remote sensing archaeology and digital heritage conservation and application. He is one of the pioneers of the theory and practice of space archaeology. His current research work focuses on adapting Big Earth Data technologies to meet the SDG11.4 assessment needs along the Belt and Road. He has undertaken more than 50 scientific research projects including National Key Technology R&D Program, National key research and development, International cooperation project, National Natural Science Foundation of China, and key projects of the State Administration of Cultural Heritage, and Strategic Priority Research Program of the CAS: Protection and development of natural and cultural heritage along the the Belt and Road, etc. He has published More than 180 academic papers and 5 books, and published "Context Environment Map of World Cultural Heritage Sites along the Silk Road".
